Online Lectures

Lectures will be online, in a blended format. There will be live synchronous sessions throughout the summer semester, with dates posted in the course calendar. There will also be pre-recorded lectures posted as well. There will be a live homework review session each Thursday, 4:30-5:30pmET. The course runs from Monday June 11 until Sunday August 5.

All links to online sessions will be posted in Blackboard calendar for that day.

Additional Learning Outcomes:

By the conclusion of this course, you are expected to have gained the ability to:

- Interpret a function from an algebraic, numerical, graphical and verbal descriptions.
- Calculate the limit of a function at a point numerically and algebraically using appropriate techniques including l'Hospital's rule.
- Compute the expression for the derivative of a function using the rules of differentiation including the power rule, product rule, and quotient rule and chain rule.
- Determine the convergence or divergence of infinite sequences and series.
- Apply the derivative to solve problems in curve sketching, optimization, and related rates.
- Understand antiderivatives as the inverse of differentiation using the Fundamental Theorem of Calculus, and apply these concepts to applications involving areas and distances.

Homework

Homework will be assigned each week. Late homework will be accepted only with an exceptionally good excuse. Points will be deducted for any late homeworks. Your lowest homework grade will be dropped.

Exams

There will be 2 mid-term exams. The first exam will be sent on July 5 to proctors and will need to be returned no later than July 8. The second exam will be sent to proctors on July 19th and will need to be returned no later than July 22. There will be a cumulative final exam emailed to proctors on Thursday August 2 to be returned by August 5th. Late exams will be deducted 10 points per day. After one day, the grade is a zero with no retakes.

Quizzes

There will be a short 15-minute online quiz each week. Your lowest quiz grade will be dropped.

Grading

Your final grade for the class is determined as a weighted average as follows:

- homework: 20% (lowest dropped)
- quizzes: 15% (lowest dropped)
- first mid-term: 20%
- second mid-term: 20%
- final exam: 25%

The letter grades are assigned as follows based on your final weighted average:

- A: 90-100
- B: 80 - 89
- C: 70 - 79
- D: 55 - 69
- F: < 55

"+" and "-" will be determined at the end of the semester.
